The double empathy problem

The double empathy problem helps us to understand why autistic people and non autistic people might struggle to understand one another. way that someone communicates is shaped by their past experiences, as well as how they perceive and process the world. We know that autistic people and non autistic people process the world differently to one another. These differences can lead to a breakdown in communication that can be uncomfortable for both the autistic and non autistic person. This highlights that theory communication style is not superior to the other - they are just different and any communication difficulty is a shared one. 

MEET THE CRISIS AUTISM NAVIGATOR - MARIA BELL




Maria is the Autism Navigator for the City & Hackney Mental Health Crisis Services. A newly commissioned post with the aim to overall access and the experiences of autistic people using mental health crisis services. Currently Maria is working on a number of projects (including collecting data on the number of autistic service users; developing staff training on autism in crisis, ensuring access to reasonable adjustments). AUTISTIC FRIENDLY PILOT – WHAT AUTISTIC PEOPLE TELL US

We know that autistic people experience poorer health outcomes than the non autistic people (Rydzewska et al., 2019). Autistic people are more likely to suffer from long term chronic conditions (Croen L, et al., 2015), mental health difficulties (Brede et al, 2022) and sleep disturbances and restricted eating patterns starting in childhood and persist in to adulthood (Weir et al. 2022) impacting on general health and wellbeing.

There is a lot of evidence to show autistic people face many barriers when trying to get the healthcare that they need. You can <u>WATCH THIS</u> YouTube video from Autistic Drs International to find out more.

We used a survey (as well as telephone and face to face interviews) to collect views from Autistic residents in Hackney to find out about the barriers people face when visiting their GP practice.



Barriers to visiting the GP for autistic residents

As shown in the current research, Autistic residents told us that they often find it difficult to manage the sensory environment of the GP practice. Many people said that they found not knowing what to expect (like knowing how long they might be waiting or who they would see) made visiting the GP anxiety provoking. Some people said using the phone to make an appointment was a big reason why they did not visit the GP. Many people also told us that interacting with staff who did not understand autism and how they could adapt their communication was a barrier.
