Applying for secondary school

Who should apply?

If your child was born between 1 September 2015 and 31 August 2016, you need to apply for a secondary school place starting September 2027.

When?

Apply by 31 October 2026. Offer day is Monday 1 March 2027.

How to apply

- Apply online: www.eadmissions.org.uk
- List up to six schools in any London local authority.
- Include local schools near your home.
- You must list the schools in the order you prefer, with your favourite school listed first. All preferences are considered equally.
- Schools cannot see the order in which you have ranked your preferences. Make sure you are aware of schools that require a supplementary information form to be completed in addition to your eAdmissions online/paper-based application.
- It is a good idea to list your nearest schools. If you do not apply for any of the schools close to you, there is a risk that, if you do not secure a place at one of your preferences, local schools may already be full and your child could end up having to travel further away to get to school.

They provide children with exceptional facilities, excellent learning opportunities and highly professional staff.

We will do all we can to guide you through the process, and the Education and Early Years Service is available to support you with your application if you need it.

Starting secondary school in 2027

If your child was born between 1 September 2015 and 31 August 2016, they are expected to start secondary school in September 2027.

Children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND)

All secondary schools have written policies (SEND policy and SEND information report) outlining how they support pupils who have been identified as having SEND. Most children with SEND can successfully attend mainstream schools with additional support. You will be able to see the school's SEND policy and SEND information report on its website, or you can contact the school you are interested in to request a copy.

If your child has SEND, but does not yet have an education, health and care (EHC) plan, you must apply for a secondary school place by completing an online application form. See page 7 for details. The Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCo) at your child's primary school will work with the SENCo at the secondary school to make sure the move from primary to secondary school goes as smoothly as possible.

Children with an EHC plan

If your child has an EHC plan, you do not need to complete an online secondary school application. The City of London SEND Team will support you with the process. It will help you to identify and apply to schools appropriate to your child's needs. Once a school has been agreed, it will be named on your child's EHC plan.

Key factors when considering schools

Get started

Our advice is: don't wait! Give yourself as much time as possible to explore and consider your options so that you can apply to schools that best fit your child's needs and aspirations and whose selection criteria are favourable to you.

Finding a school

If you do not know the schools in your area, a good place to start is by looking at your local authority's secondary school guide or those of surrounding local authorities. They contain general information about the local schools. You can find schools near your home online at:

Alternatively, you can visit the Department for Education's website:

This website provides a comprehensive list of schools across England, and it also allows you to access performance tables that give information on pupils' results at each school.

Each school's information page provides a link to its Ofsted report. An Ofsted report details a school's strengths and weaknesses in terms of teaching staff and leadership, alongside its status at the time of its last inspection. Schools are currently inspected every four years.

Once you have come up with a shortlist of schools, find out more about each one by reading its:

- prospectus: detailed information about the school and its leaders, teachers, courses, facilities and philosophy
- admissions policy: information about admissions criteria should the school receive more applications than it has places available (if it is oversubscribed).

You will find prospectuses and admissions policies on each school's website or you can contact them directly to request copies.

Get a complete picture

Prospectuses, league tables and Ofsted reports alone will not give you a complete picture of a school. Therefore, we advise you to visit the school for a closer look at its location, facilities and surroundings. This will give you a taste of its educational environment. You may also be able to arrange to speak with teachers, administrative staff and, if possible, pupils. Most schools hold open days or open evenings. Attending these along with your child will give you a better feel for the school. Information about open days is available in the local authority's school admissions prospectus or by contacting the school.



Look at the admissions criteria

On your application form, you should list all the schools you want to apply to in order of preference. Some schools receive more applications than they have places to offer. So, you should always look at the admissions criteria for each of your preferred schools and consider whether you meet them.

How to choose a school — before you apply

Are your preferences realistic?

Consider how likely it is that your child will be offered a place at your preferred schools. Read the admissions criteria for each school and figure out which criteria apply to your child.

Do you live close enough to get a place?

The distance from home to school of the last child offered a place at any school from previous years (i.e. the cut-off distance) should be available via each local authority's school admissions booklet. Remember that although this information can be used to give you an idea of how likely it is that you will be offered a place, the cut-off distance will change every year. We can never guarantee any child will be offered a place at any school.

How will your child travel to school?

It is very important that your child arrives on time to school each day. A long journey at peak times could make it difficult and may not be the best choice for your child. London has a great network of buses, Underground, Overground and rail links, making it easy to get to any of our local schools.



Does the school's curriculum match your child's interests and talents?

While all maintained schools follow the national curriculum, others focus on certain disciplines such as music, maths, science or athletics.

Does the school have extended services such as breakfast clubs, after-school clubs and after-school activities?

Are there supervised activities for pupils outside normal school hours, if parents and carers are at work?

What facilities does the school offer?

Are the buildings, classrooms and grounds well equipped and maintained?

What do other parents think about the school?

Find out about the experiences of parents with children at the schools you are interested in.

Which school does your child prefer?

Now is the time to get their opinion. This could be a tie-breaker. Ask them where they would like to go. Starting secondary school can be unsettling, especially if it is in a different part of the city from their primary school and none of their friends are going there. But remember that the right school for your friend's child may not be the right school for your child.

You can always contact us!

It is important to do your research and make up your own mind about the schools to which you apply. The School Admissions Team can provide impartial, expert advice about how likely you are to be offered a place at City schools.

How to apply — the process

You must apply through the local authority where your child lives, regardless of where the school is located. Do not list independent fee-paying schools, as you need to apply to them directly.

1. To make an application online, please visit the eAdmissions website: **www.eadmissions.org.uk**. If you are unable to apply online, please contact the School Admissions Team at **eeyservice@cityoflondon.gov.uk**
2. You can apply to any school located in any borough, up to a maximum of six schools. We highly recommend that you apply to as many schools as you can, as this will increase your chances of getting one of your preferred schools.
3. List the schools in the order you prefer, with your favourite school listed first. Your preference order is not disclosed to schools. Make sure you are aware of schools that require a supplementary information form (SIF) to be completed in addition to your eAdmissions online/ paper-based application.
4. It is a good idea to list your nearest schools. If you do not apply for any of the schools close to you, there is a risk that, if you do not secure a place at one of your preferences, local schools may already be full and your child could end up having to travel further away to get to school.

There is also an option to apply to City of London Academy Islington, City of London Academy (Southwark) and The City Academy, Hackney, where there are priority places available to City families.

As part of the admissions process, some schools may require your child to sit a fair banding test (see below). Your child must sit this test; otherwise, their chances of obtaining a school place may be greatly reduced. If you have questions about test arrangements, please check relevant school websites or contact the school(s) directly.

What is a SIF and why is it needed?

A SIF provides additional information that some schools use to allocate places when they are oversubscribed (they have received more applications than they have places to offer).

To find out if your chosen schools require a SIF, you can either contact them directly or, if you apply online, the eAdmissions website will tell you. You must send the completed SIF directly to the school and not to the City of London. Choosing not to complete the SIF could reduce your chances of getting a place at that school if it is oversubscribed. Most voluntary-aided schools, foundation schools and some academies require a SIF.

Fair banding tests

There is no passing or failing these tests. Pupils are tested and grouped into 'bands' according to their abilities. The school will then offer places to an equal number of pupils in each band.

Remember: The deadline for applications is 31 October 2026

How to apply — the criteria

Applying under sibling criteria

If your child has a brother or sister attending any of your preferred schools at the time of admission in September 2027, you should complete the box marked 'Sibling details' alongside the relevant school.

Applying on exceptional grounds

If you are making an application based on medical, social, religious, philosophical or educational grounds, explain your reasons in the 'Reasons for preference' section of the application form.

Check the school's admission arrangements to confirm whether these grounds are considered and what supporting evidence is required. Any evidence requested, such as a letter from a doctor or educational psychologist, must be submitted by the application deadline.

Oversubscription criteria – an example

The list below indicates the order in which schools that are oversubscribed will prioritise applicants:

1. Children looked after by the local authority
2. Children whose siblings attend the school
3. Distance to school from the child's home address.

Admissions authority

For foundation and voluntary-aided schools the admission authority responsible for admissions decisions is the school's governing body. For academies and free schools, it is the academy trust, while for community and voluntary-controlled schools, it is the local authority.

Proof of home address

Your address details will be checked by the City of London Council Tax Team. You will be asked to provide additional supporting documentation if the Council Tax Team is unable to verify your details. It is important that you give accurate information on your application form, as this can affect the outcome of your application.

You are also required to provide proof of the child's residence. The document must not be older than one year and should be either uploaded to the eAdmissions system or sent electronically to the School Admissions Team. This can be in the form of a benefits entitlement letter, NHS letter or any other document that has your child's name and address.

Note: The offer of a school place can be withdrawn if the information supplied is knowingly incorrect. An admissions authority can also take legal action against anyone who has knowingly given false information to get a school place for their child.

Your child's home address

If you are separated from your child's other parent and your child lives partly with you and partly with the other parent, you should state the address where your child lives most of the time.

How to apply — the allocation

If you have an equal shared care arrangement, state the address of the parent claiming child benefit, receiving tax credits linked to the child or whose address is registered at the child's GP. If you are making an online application, you can upload documents to your eAdmissions account. You can email original copies to the School Admissions Team.

Note: You cannot submit more than one application for your child. Only one address can be used for school admission purposes. The final decision to process an application will rest with the School Admissions Team.

What happens after you have submitted your form?

All London local authorities, and some local authorities bordering London, are part of the Pan London eAdmissions System. The scheme coordinates applications across local authority borders.

Your child will be considered separately by each school based on their application form. The schools do not know which other schools you have listed or your order of preference.

If a school is not oversubscribed, every child who applies will be offered a place.

If a school is oversubscribed, places will be allocated by its admissions authority in accordance with the school's oversubscription criteria. The oversubscription criteria are part of a school's admissions policy. Children meeting a higher priority criterion will be more likely to get a place than those meeting lower-priority criteria. You can get a copy of the policy from each school's admissions authority.

Your child will receive only one offer. If more than one school can offer them a place, the school making the offer will be your child's highest preference and all lower preferences will be withdrawn and released to other children. Therefore, please make sure you put the school you really want first.

The results of your application will be sent to you on National Offer Day, which is 1 March 2027. If you applied online, you will receive an email alert that evening informing you of the outcome of your application, and/or a text telling you where you can view the outcome online.

Late applications

Applications received after the closing date will be deemed 'late applications' and will be considered after those received on time. If there are exceptional reasons why you could not make the deadline, please write to the School Admissions Team and provide supporting evidence.

If you wish to change your school preferences after the closing date, your application will be treated as a late application.



Myth busters — get the facts!

My child has a right to a place at one of my preferred schools.

Not true! Your child will only be offered a place if they qualify according to the school's admission criteria. If your child does not qualify for any of your preferred schools (e.g. your preferences were unrealistic), they will usually be offered a place at the nearest school to your home with a vacancy remaining after all on-time applicants have been offered places.

I don't need to apply because I have an older child already at the school.

Not true! Everyone must apply for their child even if they have a brother or sister already at the school. Most schools give priority to brothers and sisters but if you don't apply you could miss out on a place.

If I list only one school, then I have to be offered a place.

Not true! Listing only one school does not increase your child's chances of being offered a place. You are strongly advised to include your nearest schools among your preferences. If the school is unable to offer your child a place, they will be allocated a place at an alternative school.

I live nearer to the school than the last child offered a place under the distance criterion last year so I'm guaranteed a place.

Not true! The home-to-school distance of the last child offered a place will change every year.

Children in my road go to the school so my child will too.

Not always! The number of pupils offered a place under each criterion at each school can change every year. Knowing pupils living near you that go to a certain school does not mean that your child will be offered a place there.

If I apply to a school in another borough, their residents will have priority over me.

Not always! Some admission authorities may give priority to local children, i.e. based on postcode. However, published admissions criteria cannot include the borough of residence. You should read the admission arrangements to see how children are prioritised for a place.

Faith schools are only for children from the specific faith which the school supports.

Faith schools align with whichever faith they support but they welcome children of all faiths and no faith. You do not have to attend a place of worship to be considered for a place.

Getting your results — national offer day

The results of your application will be sent to you on National Offer Day, which is 1 March 2027. If you applied online, you will receive an email alert that evening informing you of the outcome of your application and telling you where you can view the outcome online. The School Admissions Team will send you an email telling you:

- how to accept the place
- what to do if your child was not offered a place at any of their chosen schools
- how to appeal a decision.

Accepting an offer

You can accept the offered school place by:

- completing the online acceptance form via your eAdmissions account
- replying to the offer day email.

Either way, the School Admissions Team must receive your response by 15 March 2027 or your place may be offered to another child.

What if my child has a place at a private or independent school?

If you have accepted a place for your child at a private or independent school, please let the School Admissions Team know in writing as soon as possible so that the state school place can be offered to another child.

How do waiting lists work?

Your child's place on a waiting list is determined by the school's oversubscription criteria, not by how long they have been waiting.

Children meeting higher-priority criteria will be higher on the list than those meeting lower-priority criteria.

Your child's place can move down if children meeting higher criteria than yours join the list.

Late applications are included on the waiting list and are treated in the same way as on-time applications.

Acceptance deadline

If your acceptance is not received by 15 March 2027, your place may be offered to another child.

If you are likely to be away from home between 1 March and 15 March 2027, please let the School Admissions Team know in advance by emailing:

Appeal process — how to present your appeal

If you do not receive an offer from your preferred school, you can appeal against the refusal. What you need to do:

- Contact the school you want to make an appeal to as soon as possible. It will provide you with information about its appeal process, e.g. what you will need to do and by when.

- Present your appeal. Your appeal will be heard during May, June and July 2027 by the appeal panel, which is made up of people who have not been involved in any way in the allocation of school places.

If you intend to make an appeal, you should still accept the school place you have been offered so that your child will have a place if your appeal is unsuccessful. Accepting the place you have been offered will not affect the outcome of your appeal.

The appeal panel's decision is final.

In-year admissions

What are in-year admissions?

An in-year application is an application made outside the normal admissions rounds. The normal admissions rounds are for children applying to start Reception at primary school, Year 3 at junior school or Year 7 at secondary school in September.

You must complete an in-year application if your child:

- is transferring from one secondary school to another
- has been educated at home and now wishes to apply for a school place
- is leaving an independent school to move to the state sector
- is newly arrived in the UK and is looking for a school place.

What do I need to do?

That depends, as the in-year admissions application process varies. With some schools, you apply directly to the school. With others, you will need to complete the local authority's in-year application form. Contact the school directly to find out more.

Is there a closing date for in-year admissions?

No, although we advise you to make your application as soon as possible.

I do not like the school that my child is currently attending and want to change their school. Can I make an in-year admissions application?

Yes, but before you do so, please consider that moving schools can be very unsettling for children, particularly if they are preparing for exams or have difficulty adapting to new situations, surroundings and friendship groups.

Places for children living in the City of London:

Under the academy's oversubscription criteria, eligible applicants residing in the City of London fall within Catchment Area One. Based on previous years, it is estimated that **5–10 places at most** may be available to City of London residents.

University technical colleges and studio schools

Children born between 1 September 2012 and 31 August 2013, and who are currently in Year 9, are eligible to apply for a place at a university technical college (UTC) or a studio school for the September 2027 intake. UTCs and studio schools offer pupils more than the traditional GCSE and A level curriculum. As your child progresses through their secondary education, you may feel they would benefit from a more vocational curriculum offer focused on technical subjects.

UTCs

UTCs are schools for 14 to 19-year-olds. They have university and employer sponsors and combine practical and academic studies. UTCs specialise in subjects that need modern, technical, industry-standard equipment, such as engineering and construction. These are taught alongside business skills and information and communication technology (ICT).

UTCs are smaller than traditional secondary schools. As well as core academic subjects, UTCs provide one or two technical specialisms, which are linked to the skills gaps within their area. Pupils can study GCSEs, A levels and other relevant qualifications matched to these specialisms.

Studio schools

Studio schools are also schools for 14 to 19-year-olds that are backed by local businesses and employers. They often have a specialism but focus on equipping young people with a wide range of employability skills and a core of academic qualifications, delivered in a practical and project-based way.

Studio schools usually start at 9.00am and finish at 5.00pm and feel more like a workplace than a school. Studio schools will offer a range of academic and vocational qualifications, including GCSEs in English, maths and science, as well as work placements linked directly to employment opportunities in the local area.

You can apply to a UTC or studio school online at www.eadmissions.org.uk or complete a paper application, which you can get by contacting the School Admissions Team.

The deadline for applying for the 2027/28 academic year is 31 October 2026. We will send the results of your application during the day of 1 March 2027.

If you applied online, you will receive an email alert that evening informing you of the outcome of your application telling you where you can view the outcome online.

While most UTCs and studio schools have the same application timeline as secondary schools, some may have different timetables in their first year of operation. Please speak to the UTC or studio school directly for further information.

Support for parents and carers

Transport for London (TfL) 11–15 Zip Oyster photocards

Children aged 11–15 can get free and discounted travel on all TfL transport services with a Zip Oyster photocard.

It includes:

- free travel on buses and trams
- child-rate pay-as-you-go fares on the Tube, DLR, London Overground, Elizabeth line (excluding between West Drayton and Reading) and London Cable Car
- 50% off most fares on National Rail services
- 50% off adult-rate tickets on the Uber Boat by Thames Clippers River Bus services.

Help with home-to-school travel costs: City of London Home to School Transport Policy

The City of London may fund free train travel to and from school if these criteria are met:

- Your child lives in the City of London.
- Your child is of secondary school age (11–16 years).
- The school is the nearest suitable one with a vacancy.
- The school is more than three miles from your child's home.

Help for parents/carers on low incomes

The criteria for home-to-school travel assistance are slightly different if you are on a low income, live in the City of London and receive qualifying benefits. In this case, your child may be eligible for free train travel if:

- their school is between two and six miles from your home
- their school is one of the three nearest suitable* schools.

* A suitable school is one that the City of London considers appropriate for the pupil's age, aptitude and ability.

Free school meals

If you receive Universal Credit, your child should be entitled to free school meals.

Additional support may also be available to families receiving certain other benefits.

To apply for free school meals, contact the local authority where your child's school is located.

School clothing grants

The school clothing grant is a discretionary payment of £160, made in August each year, to help with the cost of school uniforms and footwear, including PE kits. For this support, you must meet all of the following criteria:

- You and your child must live in the City of London.
- Your child must attend a publicly funded secondary school.
- There is an agreed school uniform.
- You must be eligible for Targeted Free School Meals, meaning your household is in receipt of Universal Credit with annual household earnings of £7,400 or less, or another qualifying benefit under the existing free school meals criteria.

The grant is paid at the discretion of the City of London.
