We are pleased to welcome Anne Hayward, our new SEND Consultant, to the City. She has been a Headteacher, Deputy Director of Education and a former Ofsted Inspector. She has worked for many local authorities, schools, colleges and settings advising on SEND.

Anne and her colleague, Kay Charles, who is Executive Principal of two outstanding special schools in Brent – The Village School and Woodfield School – are undertaking visits to all schools who have City of London pupils who have an Education Health Care (EHC) Plan.

The visits will commence w/b 28 June. You will have received notification of this visit and details are in a letter from Theresa Shortland, Head of Education and Early Years. If you require any further details please <u>email Anne</u>.

This is a visit to support SENCOs and to share best practice nationally with a wealth of resources that both Anne and Kay have written or collected during their work. They will be using an amended London Leadership SEND Review Audit tool and Nasen's Whole School SEND review which is excellent.

Anne is developing our SEND Hub – ' Going the extra square mile' – a dedicated page on our website for professionals and parents in order that we can share high quality resources and research. This should be up and running by September and will be a source of invaluable resources.

Anne is also chairing the City of London Academy Trust and Family of Schools SENCO Network.

Anne and Laurence Hime, the City of London's Principal Educational Psychologist, are looking for ideas and feedback from you. Let us know what support and/or access you need so we can put relevant packages together for you.

Update on OFSTED

There are some changes to the inspection handbook. Key aspects are:

- Recognising the COVID-19 context | impact on the school
- The curriculum | how it has been adapted and prioritised; filling the gaps in pupils knowledge, integrating remote learning into the curriculum
- Community | how leaders supported the school community and how vulnerable pupils were kept safe and prioritised for face to face education and how staff and pupils well-being have been promoted
- Best possible attendance | how this was achieved

Anne and Kay have put together an Ofsted inspection overview - Evaluating the education inspection framework - that you might find useful.

COVID-19 recovery

Woodfield School has a <u>good recovery curriculum for pupils and students with SEND</u> <u>and rationale</u> which SENCOs will find useful. They also have a great presentation on their <u>Mental Health Strategy</u>, which you can also download.

Addressing challenging behaviour

We are including a link to a useful handbook, <u>Positive Behaviour Support</u>. It includes information about positive behaviour support and addressing challenging behaviour with tiers of support, zones of regulation and creating positive behaviour plans. It has been produced by The Village School, in partnership with Compass Learning and Woodfield School.

Update on Supported Internships

There are going to be 500 more NHS supported internship opportunities for young adults with Education, Health and Care plans. Project SEARCH strategic partnership with NHS England, Health Education England, NHS Improvement and NHS Employers are to set up 42 new funded supported internships programme providing 500 placements in hospital trusts across England by September 2022.


Mental Health and Wellbeing Focus Groups

Bus Service

We encourage independent travel by users to and from all activities. However, a bus service is provided for users in need of travel support - very limited spaces. Suitability for this service is assessed at referral meeting.





Tower Hamlets & City SENDIASS (Special Educational Needs Information, Advice and Support Service)

The SENDIASS Team offers free and impartial advice to parents and young people with SEND who are residents within Tower Hamlets or City of London. Some of the ways we can support you are:

- Attending meetings with schools/professionals
- Applying for an Education Health and Care Plan
- Mediation with the Local Authority
- Preparing and attending SEND Tribunals
- Providing information about other support services and departments.

Our team also runs workshops for parents around the EHCP process, Annual Reviews, and Secondary School Transitions.

If your query can not be resolved during the telephone consultation, we will take a referral and you will be allocated a caseworker who will contact you within 10 working days.
