Did you know?

- Talking to your baby from birth can help them learn and develop good vocabulary for life.
- By age five, a child's vocabulary can predict their education success age 30.
- A child's vocabulary at two years of age is a clear indicator of their reading ability aged 11.
- On average, a child between 18 months and two years learns eight new words a day.
- Children learn more from conversations than from instructions.

Where to find Support


The City of London Early Years team run a speech, language and communication programme called COLTALE. This means 'City of London Talks and Listens Enthusiastically'.

The programme has been designed to help parents, teachers and practitioners have a better understanding of language development and how it relates to a child's growth. Schools and nurseries in the City have adopted the programme and use COLTALE as part of their curriculum.

No 3:


Attend a local 'stay and play' or 'rhyme time' session.
